- 1 The deposition of ANNE SULLIVAN was taken

- 8 ANNE SULLIVAN,
- 9 a witness, having been duly sworn to tell the truth,
- 10 was examined and testified upon her oath as follows:
- 11 THE WITNESS: I do.
- 12 DIRECT EXAMINATION
- 13 BY MS. POWERS SELLERS:
- Q. Can you please state your full name?
- 15 A. Anne Francis Sullivan.
- 16 Q. How are you employed?
- 17 A. I work for Tampa Bay Veterinary Specialist as a
- 18 customer service representative.
- 19 Q. Okay. Are you working in Building A or
- 20 Building B primarily?
- 21 A. I work both. I've been working more in
- 22 Building A now due to our staffing needs versus
- 23 Building B.
- Q. Okay. Back in March?
- 25 A. Building B.

- 1 Q. Have you ever given a deposition before?
- 2 A. No, I have not.
- 3 Q. Okay. So it's very simple. Any one of us may
- 4 be asking you questions. You just tell us the truth
- 5 because you're under oath. If you don't understand
- 6 something or you need us to rephrase the question, just
- 7 tell us.
- 8 A. Okay.
- 9 Q. Okay. How long have you been working with the
- 10 vet clinic?
- 11 A. It's been about a year and three months; August
- 12 of 2022.
- 13 Q. Okay. And were you working on March 21st of
- 14 this year, which was a Tuesday, when law enforcement
- 15 showed up?
- 16 A. Yes.
- 17 Q. And what time did you get to work that morning?
- 18 A. I got to work about 7:00 a.m.
- 19 Q. When you got to work, how did you enter into
- 20 your office, your A Building?
- 21 A. Our building has a separate entrance, which I
- 22 have a key for. I entered in that way and went into
- 23 my -- into our phone room area and -- to get myself
- 24 logged in and set up for the day.
- 25 Q. And do you recall talking to law enforcement,

- 1 whenever, back in March?
- 2 A. On that day, yes.
- 3 Q. Okay. So you had told them back then that you
- 4 initially tried to enter in through the main lobby.
- 5 A. Oh, yes.
- 6 Q. The doors were locked?
- 7 A. Yes, the door was locked and I used my key.
- 8 Sometimes we've gone in and out of the front door to
- 9 access our -- our area as well, but I saw the door was
- 10 locked, and then of course, came around to the back with
- 11 my key and let myself in.
- 12 Q. Okay. There are a lot of doors in those
- 13 buildings, aren't there?
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 Q. And to my knowledge back in March, there were
- 16 three businesses: The attorneys' office, the vet office
- 17 and the tech company.
- 18 A. Mm-hmm.
- 19 O. Is that accurate?
- 20 A. Correct, yes.
- 21 Q. And there are other empty offices within the --
- the administrative building, we'll call it?
- 23 A. Right.
- Q. And so do you know if there's someone who is
- 25 responsible for checking all of these doors to make sure

- 1 they are locked every night, or are you-all just kind of
- 2 counting on your individual --
- 3 A. We always counted on our individual businesses.
- 4 When we -- when we leave our part of it, we would lock
- 5 our door that goes to the main hallway into the main
- 6 entrance area. We usually lock that door at night and
- 7 then lock our door going to the outside.
- 8 Q. So I'm not suggesting that this has or has not
- 9 happened, but if someone were to leave their internal
- 10 door, that would be the door that leads into the lobby,
- if they were to leave that door open and there was any
- 12 other door in another office that was unlocked,
- 13 technically, anyone would be able to access that -- that
- 14 business?
- 15 A. Correct.
- 16 Q. And are you aware of internal surveillance
- 17 company -- or surveillance cameras, like indoors?
- 18 A. Not in this building, that I know of, not
- 19 inside.
- Q. When -- what are your hours that you normally
- 21 work?
- 22 A. 7:00 to 5:00, Monday through Friday.
- 23 Q. Have you observed any or have you been made
- 24 aware of the homeless population in the area, or anyone
- 25 loitering around that office complex?

- 1 A. Yes, there have been times when I've come in
- 2 early in the morning, there was a homeless man sleeping
- 3 outside the door. There was another time when, between
- 4 our -- our two buildings there was a homeless guy
- 5 sleeping during the day, which I called police to have
- 6 him escorted off the property.
- 7 Q. You say you started working there in August of
- 8 2022.
- 9 A. Correct.
- 10 Q. Do you recall when these happened? Were they
- 11 close together in time or is this an ongoing issue?
- 12 A. It has -- it has been ongoing because of the
- 13 homeless population in the area. We have caught people
- 14 sleeping outside near the bushes and so on.
- 15 Q. Have you seen any evidence of drugs? You know,
- 16 needles, anything like that?
- 17 A. No, I have not.
- 18 Q. Okay. But you personally have called to have
- 19 someone escorted off the property?
- 20 A. Yes.
- 21 Q. Do you recall when that incident was?
- 22 A. No, not exactly.
- Q. Approximately?
- 24 A. I don't.
- Q. Was it soon after you started?

- 1 A. I would say -- I would say maybe three or four
- 2 months after I started; really rough guessing.
- 3 Q. Okay. And other than your personal experiences
- 4 and observations, have you been made aware of other
- 5 incidents?
- 6 A. No.
- 7 MS. POWERS SELLERS: Okay. I believe that is
- 8 all I have.
- 9 Bjorn, Willengy?
- 10 MR. BRUNVAND: I don't have any questions.
- MS. RAMOS WICKS: I don't have any questions.
- MS. POWERS SELLERS: I'm doubting myself here,
- I -- just let me ask you one more.
- 14 BY MS. POWERS SELLERS:
- 15 Q. When you spoke to law enforcement, did they ask
- 16 you if you had seen anything unusual that day?
- 17 A. The day of the event that this happened?
- 18 Q. Yes.
- 19 A. Not that I can recall.
- Q. Did you see anything unusual?
- 21 A. Not that morning. I came into the office, got
- 22 myself situated, and maybe around 9:00-ish, give or
- 23 take, I went into the hallway to go to the bathroom.
- 24 That's when I smelled a very strong smell of bleach. I
- 25 didn't know who was using the bleach or where the smell

- 1 was coming from.
- 2 Used the bathroom, came back in. And that was
- 3 about the only thing odd that happened. And then
- 4 Blanchard Law had called. The female that was working
- 5 there said that one of their employees was missing and
- 6 hasn't come back to his desk. And I got up, and with my
- 7 co-worker here, Deb, we went and looked in some of these
- 8 offices, some of the suites that were unlocked on the
- 9 inside just to look, because, you know, see that
- 10 someone -- hear that someone is missing, you go look,
- 11 see maybe if there was a medical event, did something
- 12 happen. Didn't see anything.
- 13 Q. Let me stop you there. Let me stop you there.
- 14 A. Sure.
- 15 Q. When you say you went to look into the empty
- 16 offices, these are offices that -- are they part of the
- 17 space that you rent or are they just empty offices
- 18 waiting for another person to come in and rent them?
- 19 A. Waiting for another person to come in and rent
- 20 them.
- 21 Q. But did you --
- 22 A. I'm sorry.
- 23 Q. That's okay. You go ahead. What you have to
- 24 say is more important.
- 25 A. When you leave our office to go into the

- 1 hallway, there are two suites on the right-hand side
- 2 that are unoccupied, but unlocked from the inside.
- 3 Those are the offices we went into just to look to see
- 4 maybe did someone fall, get hurt, have a medical issue.
- Didn't see anything. Came back. And then we
- 6 were alerted a little bit later on that the police were
- 7 called, that Mr. Cozzi had not returned to his office.
- 8 And we just, you know, came -- we're working in our --
- 9 in our own offices. The police were in and out all day.
- 10 And, you know, that was pretty much how the events
- 11 unfolded.
- 12 Q. When you walked around -- well, so I'm looking
- 13 at the police report, and there's just very brief --
- 14 there's a couple of sentences.
- 15 A. Okay.
- 16 Q. When you spoke with law enforcement, did you
- 17 tell them about this interaction that you had with the
- individual from Blanchard, and about the bleach smell,
- 19 and then walking around and checking offices?
- 20 A. Yeah, I told them everything.
- 21 Q. Okay.
- 22 A. Yeah.
- 23 Q. And that's why we do these depositions, because
- 24 they don't -- it doesn't always make it because there's
- 25 a lot of chaos.

- 1 So when you walked around the restroom, did you
- 2 or the individual that was with you go into or open the
- 3 door to the men's restroom?
- 4 A. No.
- 5 Q. So did you-all go into the ladies' room?
- 6 A. No, because I had just come from the ladies'
- 7 room a few minutes prior. And then when the woman from
- 8 Blanchard called, she -- I got up and I said, hey, you
- 9 know, they have an employee missing. Maybe we should
- 10 look around and see if something may have happened.
- We went to those two suites, and then really
- 12 that was about it. We just walked out toward the lobby
- 13 area, didn't see anything, couldn't figure out where the
- 14 smell was coming from. I returned to my desk.
- 15 Q. When you went into those empty suites, did
- 16 either of you check the doors to make sure that those
- doors leading to the outside of the building were
- 18 locked?
- 19 A. I did not.
- 20 Q. Okay. And when you didn't know where the smell
- 21 was coming from, did you have a general idea of where
- 22 you thought it was coming from? A specific hallway, a
- 23 specific door, maybe? You didn't know what it was, but
- 24 did you know the direction?
- 25 A. Yeah. Heading toward of the lobby area where

- 1 the restrooms were it was very strong. I thought maybe
- 2 somebody was doing a deep cleaning. But, yeah, it was
- 3 very strong.
- 4 Q. Did you see anyone check the men's restroom, or
- 5 did anyone talk about, hey, maybe we should look into
- 6 the men's restroom?
- 7 A. No.
- 8 Q. Okay. To your knowledge, the person that was
- 9 missing was a male?
- 10 A. Yes.
- 11 Q. Okay. Did anyone -- did you see anyone open
- 12 the men's restroom door?
- 13 A. No, I did not.
- Q. When law enforcement got there later, there's
- 15 an indication that the door was -- may have been open
- 16 for some period of time.
- 17 Did you observe that?
- 18 A. No, I did not. The only time that I went back
- 19 in the hallway, I saw one of the Largo police officers
- 20 standing in front of the door.
- 21 Q. Was the door open or closed?
- 22 A. Closed.
- 23 MS. POWERS SELLERS: Okay. I think that's all
- I have now. I'm sorry.
- 25 THE WITNESS: Okay.

- 1 MS. POWERS SELLERS: But my colleagues may have
- 2 follow-up questions.
- 3 Bjorn or Willengy.
- 4 MS. RAMOS WICKS: Nothing that I can think of.
- I did take, like, additional notes, but I don't see
- 6 anything that I need to ask.
- 7 MS. POWERS SELLERS: Okay. Bjorn? I think he
- 8 is frozen. Very happily, but he looks like he's
- 9 fine.
- 10 MR. BRUNVAND: I don't have any questions
- 11 either. Thank you for asking.
- MS. POWERS SELLERS: Okay. That is all we
- have. Thank you. We appreciate your waiting. Have
- 14 a nice day.
- 15 THE COURT REPORTER: We need to do the read or
- 16 waive.
- MS. POWERS SELLERS: I almost forgot.
